Your government

Over the past two years, Quebecers have shown remarkable perseverance and adaptability that have helped our economy to return to its pre-pandemic level more quickly than elsewhere in Canada.

The strong global economic recovery and the invasion of Ukraine by Russia have sparked a substantial increase in the cost of living. This is why your government is acting now by providing direct assistance to more than 6.4 million Quebecers.

In addition, thanks to the sound management of public finances, which it has made a priority, the government can now invest in restoring the health care system and adapting it to the new post-pandemic reality.

Budget 2022-2023 also meets the challenges awaiting Québec over the next few years by investing in the government's other missions such as education, the economy, the environment, culture and support for communities. Budget 2022-2023 provides additional investments totalling more than \$22B over the next five years for:

COPING WITH THE RISING COST OF LIVING (\$3.8B)



THE QUÉBEC ECONOMY IS SHOWING EXTRAORDINARY PERFORMANCE

Real GDP grew by 6.3% in 2021

- Return to a pre-pandemic level quicker than in Ontario and Canada
- The recovery is more robust than elsewhere in Canada

Québec is back to full employment with an unemployment rate of 4.5% in February 2022



Inflation will remain high in 2022 before moderating

The evolution of the pandemic and the effects of the Russian invasion of Ukraine are sources of uncertainty for economic and financial forecasts

QUÉBEC'S FINANCIAL SITUATION HAS GREATLY IMPROVED

Sound management of public finances is a priority for the government

The structural deficit forecast for 2026-2027 has fallen by more than \$3B in a year and now stands at \$2.8B

The return to a balanced budget is still forecast for 2027-2028, and will continue to be based on:

- the government's commitment not to increase the tax burden
- the acceleration of economic growth
- adequate funding of the government's chief missions
- growth in expenditure linked to growth in revenue
- an increase in federal contributions for health care spending

There are significant benefits to reducing the debt burden and the government intends to set new reduction targets in the 2023-2024 budget



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
